"The nun Wu Jincang once asked Huineng, the Sixth Patriarch, to explain passages of the Nirvan Sutra to her. Huineng couldn't read and he asked her to read the passages aloud. Astonished that the revered Zen master could neither read nor write, Jincang wondered



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how Huineng could understand the teachings. Huineng replied: "Words are not truth.

Truth is like the moon, and words are like my finger. I can point to the moon with my finger, but my finger is not the moon. Do you need my finger to see the moon?"
